#### **TODAY'S SERVICE**

Today's service combines the Installation of the new Lord Prior of the Most Venerable Order of the Hospital of St John of Jerusalem and the triennial Investiture of new Dames and Knights of the Order. The Grand Prior, His Royal Highness The Duke of Gloucester, will preside over the ceremony. Those present today include leading members of the Priories of England and the Islands, Scotland, Wales, South Africa, New Zealand, Canada, Australia, the United States of America, Kenya, and Singapore. Also present are members of Commanderies of the Order (Ards in Northern Ireland, Jersey, Guernsey and the Isle of Man) and representatives of St John Associations of Bermuda, Sri Lanka, Trinidad and Tobago, and Uganda. Friends and family of the new Lord Prior have travelled from Australia to be present at the Installation, and the Australian High Commissioner to the United Kingdom is represented by the Acting High Commissioner, Mr Matt Anderson.

The Order works in close co-operation with the other mutually-recognised Orders of St John who are also represented today. These are: the Johanniterorden in Germany, with its dependent Commanderies in other European countries and the Orders of St John in The Netherlands and Sweden, (which together with the Order comprise the Alliance of the Orders of St John); and the Sovereign Military Order of Malta.

The Service is taken by the Right Reverend Timothy Stevens CBE, the Prelate of The Order.

The Service will be attended by Her Majesty's Lord-Lieutenant for Greater London, Sir Kenneth Olisa OBE CStJ, and the Worshipful the Mayor of Islington, Councillor Rakhia Ismai.

The Choir are the Temple Singers, the organist is Roger Sayer and the Fanfare Trumpeters are from the Regimental Band of the Grenadier Guards.

Throughout this Order of Service instructions and explanations are shown in red.

Congregational participation is indicated by **bold type**.

There will be a retiring collection to support the work of St John. Please use the gift aid envelopes provided. There will also be an opportunity to deposit envelopes at the Reception after the Service.

#### THE MOST VENERABLE ORDER OF THE HOSPITAL OF ST JOHN OF JERUSALEM

The Order of St John first came into being in about 1080, when Benedictine monks established a place of care in Jerusalem for pilgrims to the Holy Land, be they Christian, Muslim, or Jew. The men and women who worked in the hospital were lay persons not priests. They were members of a new religious order, known as the Hospitallers.

In England, when Henry VIII dissolved the Order as a monastic organisation in 1540, apart from a brief restoration under his daughter, Queen Mary, the English langue was never formally abolished but fell into vicissitude in the UK. In the nineteenth century it was revived, aspiring to the Order's original Hospitaller mission, and, in the spirit of Victorian philanthropy, those individuals seeking the Order's revival recognised the need to provide free first aid training, as well as the provision of care and ambulance transport services.

The Order was granted a Royal Charter by Queen Victoria in 1888. This act established it as a Royal Order of Chivalry: the Venerable Order of the Hospital of St John of Jerusalem. (The title 'Most' was bestowed by the Royal Charter in 1950 in recognition of wartime bravery). It is now represented globally by Priories and Associations. In each nation St John adapts its medical offer to meet the needs of the local population, from providing free mother and baby care in Malawi to statutory ambulance services in Western Australia. Reconnecting with its historic legacy, the Venerable Order established an Eye Hospital in Jerusalem in 1882, following the founding principles of the Hospitallers in treating all those in need, regardless of race, faith or ability to pay.

The status of a Royal Order of Chivalry comes from the Order's original Royal Charter but also reflects its continued royal patronage. Chivalric Orders classically have three marks by which they can be identified: a military origin, nobility of membership, and a Christian inspiration. Military values of discipline and gallantry remain embedded in the modern Order. Nobility is shown by the virtues of honour, probity and care for the sick and the poor and these are at the very heart of today's Order. Christian inspiration is evident: the Order welcomes people of all faiths and none, provided all continue to respect the Christian principles of the Order's founders and the values that flow from them.

A person can only be admitted to the Order with the sanction of HM The Queen or, in certain Commonwealth countries, with the sanction of the Governor-General acting on her behalf. There is no governmental or political involvement in the process of selection for membership. The eligibility criterion is that membership and promotion is for anyone who has done something special for St John or in the spirit of the Order, and their service has stood out from their peers. Such people include active volunteers, specialists, employees, and uniformed Ambulance personnel. Entry is in recognition of achievement towards the Objects of the Order – and in expectation of future involvement and contribution.

Today's proceedings reflect the nature of the Order as an Order of Chivalry of the British Crown and as a Christian Order.

#### THE ACCOLADE OF THE ORDER

Traditionally, knighthoods are confirmed by the bestowal of the Accolade at an investiture, and this continues to be the case within the Realm of the United Kingdom or certain other Realms of which Her Majesty The Queen is Sovereign. Knighthoods of the Order of St John are conferred by instrument signed by Her Majesty The Queen (or in Australia and Canada by the Governor-General acting on Her behalf).

The bestowal of the Accolade of the Order is the outward and visible sign of the approbation and the estimation in which the person upon whom it is bestowed is held and a public recognition of their appointment.

The Accolade of the Realm is bestowed by touches of the sword ('dubbing') on each shoulder of the postulant; the Accolade of the Order is bestowed by three touches of the sword on the left shoulder of the postulant. The origins of the Order's practice are not known, but it has been suggested that it is to reflect the three persons of the Holy Trinity.

The Accolade of the Order is only conferred on those who are admitted or promoted to the Grades of Bailiff Grand Cross or Knight of the Order, and then only where the postulants have not received the Accolade of one of Her Majesty's Realms.

It is implicit in the appointment of a male person to Grade I or Grade II in a Specified Order (Royal Victorian Order and UK Orders of State) that that person either is at the time of appointment or will become a Knight of the Realm. There is no corresponding implication in the case of admission in or promotion to Grade I or Grade II of the Order. Therefore, a male person appointed to Grade I or II in an Order of the Realm may use the title 'Sir' and a female person so appointed may use the title 'Dame'. There is no such entitlement in relation to the Accolade of the Order.

The bestowal of the Accolade of the Order generally mirrors the bestowal of the Accolade of the Realm of the United Kingdom. Thus, the Accolade is not conferred on ladies (save, for constitutional reasons, within the Priory of Canada).

Furthermore, as in the case of the Accolade of the Realm, the Accolade of the Order is not bestowed on clergy who are members of the Church of England or of a Church in communion with the Church of England. In such cases, instead of bestowing the Accolade, the Investing Officer affirms the postulant's appointment by placing his hand on the postulant's left shoulder.

James Bingham as a Knight of Justice – the Priory of Scotland Director of Ceremonies, a Director of St John Scotland, and a member of the St John Scotland Chapter.

The Very Reverend Dr John Cairns KCVO as a Knight of Grace – the Dean of the Priory of Scotland, a member of the Priory of Scotland's Chapter and a Director on the Board.

Wing Commander Gareth Chapman as a Knight of Grace – appointed a Trustee for the Priory for Wales in June 2017, and appointed Chancellor of that Priory last year.

lan James Dudson CBE as a Knight of Grace – for support to St John as Her Majesty's Lord Lieutenant for the County of Staffordshire in England.

John Ferguson-Smith as a Knight of Grace - a member of the Priory of Scotland's Chapter, Board member and that Priory's Hospitaller.

Colin Jones as a Knight of Grace – the deputy Chair of Cardiff & Vale St John Council, and member of the Priory for Wales Honours & Awards Committee.

Andrew Martin Latham as a Knight of Grace – for service to St John in the County of Surrey and as immediate past Director of Ceremonies of the Priory of England and the Islands.

Joseph Mackie OBE as a Knight of Grace — the Chair of the Priory of Scotland Aberdeen Area Committee and a member of the St John Scotland Chapter.

Colonel John Robert Mackenzie MBE TD as a Knight of Grace — for service to St John in the County of Northumbria in England, and for support to the St John Ambulance Bands.

Ralph James Marshall JP as a Knight of Grace – for service as Chairman of the County Priory Group for the Humber, in England.

Guy Morton as a Knight of Grace – Trustee of the St John of Jerusalem Eye Hospital Group.

Cameron Oxley as a Knight of Justice — the former Chair of St John Ambulance Victoria, current member of the National Board of St John Ambulance Australia, and in recognition of his recent appointment as Chancellor of the Priory in Australia.

Richard Roberts as a Knight of Grace – the former Divisional Officer in Charge at Rhyl, currently the Deputy Commissioner for the North Wales Region of the Priory for Wales.

Dr Sarath Samarage as a Knight of Grace - the Chairman of St John Association Sri Lanka who has overseen the introduction of the First Aid Social Enterprise programme in his country.

Anthony Tyers as a Knight of Grace - for more than 23 years of clinical work for the Eye Hospital Group, and as an active contributor to regional and international scientific meetings for St John.

Thomas Craig Wilson as a Knight of Grace – for services to the Priory of Canada.

#### THE OFFICE OF LORD PRIOR

Ultimate authority over the Order of St John is exercised by Her Majesty The Queen, as the Sovereign Head of the Order, and by His Royal Highness The Duke of Gloucester, as the Grand Prior of the Order. The Lord Prior is the most senior non-Royal member of the Order. The Office of Lord Prior has six main roles:

- the principal adviser to the Grand Prior acting on his behalf in all aspects of the Order's affairs when he is not available;
- the representative Head of the Order on any occasion on which neither the Sovereign Head nor the Grand Prior are present;
- subject to the Sovereign Head and the Grand Prior, the head of the Order in all its chivalric aspects;
- the leadership of the Order in its charitable activities by promoting policy and presiding at meetings of the Order's worldwide governing bodies;
- as a focus of unity for the members of the Order, its volunteers, staff and supporters;
   and,
- maintaining the ethos and traditions of the Order.

The Lord Prior does not take part in the day-to-day running of any of the Priories, Commanderies or St John Associations, or of St John of Jerusalem Eye Hospital Group, but he visits frequently. The Lord Prior is the Chairman of Trustees of the Order ("St John International") as a UK based charitable organisation. Since 1999, the Lord Prior has been appointed for a period of up to three years, with the possibility of re-appointment for a further period of up to three years.

## THE LORD PRIOR PROFESSOR MARK COMPTON AM GCStJ



Professor Mark Compton's main interest is the Order of St John/St John Ambulance Australia, with which he has had over 45 years of continuous voluntary service. Until June this year he was national chairman and Chancellor of the Order of St John in Australia. In addition to his board role he mentors developing leaders through the national leadership and women's mentoring programs; has actively volunteered in the field as a St John member, and contributes to international strategy development for the worldwide organisation through his membership of the international board.

Mark is an experienced non-executive director and CEO, predominantly in healthcare and life sciences organisations including Australian Securities Exchange (ASX) listed companies. He holds undergraduate and postgraduate qualifications in areas including pharmacology and business. He is the non-executive Chairman of Sonic Healthcare Limited, a global medical diagnostics and healthcare organisation; Chairman of St Luke's Care, a not for profit health and aged care organisation; and a non-executive director of Next Science Limited, an ASX listed medical technology company. Mark is Adjunct Professor in healthcare management and leadership at Macquarie University, Sydney and an active volunteer firefighter with the NSW Rural Fire Service.

He was awarded the Centenary Medal of the Commonwealth of Australia for services to the community; appointed a Knight in the Order of St John in 2004; was appointed a Member in the Order of Australia (AM) in January 2010 for services to health, hospitals, medical research and St John Ambulance. In 2017 he was promoted to Bailiff Grand Cross of the Order of St John.

Mark is married to Dr Elizabeth Ellis OStJ and they live on their property in the Southern Highlands of New South Wales. They have two sons; Michael a solicitor at Herbert Smith Freehills Sydney, and Daniel a medical practitioner in critical care medicine at Box Hill Hospital Melbourne, Australia. Elizabeth, Michael and Daniel are also active volunteers for St John and are all members of the Order. Four generations of Mark's family have been volunteers for St John.

#### THE INSTALLATION OF THE LORD PRIOR OF ST JOHN

The Order Director of Ceremonies addresses His Royal Highness The Grand Prior.

My Lord Grand Prior, Her Majesty The Sovereign Head of our Most Venerable Order has been graciously pleased to appoint Professor Mark Raymond Compton, a Member of the Order of Australia and a Bailiff Grand Cross of our Most Venerable Order to the Great Office of Lord Prior of St John. Is it your wish to receive and install him?

His Royal Highness The Grand Prior It is.

The Chancellor proceeds to the West Door, accompanied by the Order Director of Ceremonies, and leads the new Lord Prior to a position in front of the Throne. The Chancellor turns to face the assembled members of the Order and their guests and reads out the Warrant of Appointment:

The Chancellor

"His Royal Highness Prince Richard Alexander Walter George, Second Duke of Gloucester, a Knight Companion of The Most Noble Order of the Garter, a Knight Grand Cross of The Royal Victorian Order, and a Bailiff Grand Cross of The Most Venerable Order of the Hospital of St John of Jerusalem, and Grand Prior of the said Most Venerable Order, to all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting:

Know ye that we, as Grand Prior of The Most Venerable Order of the Hospital of St John of Jerusalem, with the authority and sanction of Our Sovereign Lady Queen Elizabeth the Second, the Sovereign Head of the said Order, reposing especial Trust and Confidence in Professor Mark Raymond Compton, a Member of the Order of Australia, and a Bailiff Grand Cross of the said Most Venerable Order, do by these Presents make constitute and appoint the said Professor Mark Raymond Compton to be the Lord Prior of St John of the said Most Venerable Order.

And we do also, by these Presents give and grant unto the said Professor Mark Raymond Compton the Office and place of Lord Prior of the said Most Venerable Order with the title, powers, privileges, pre-eminences and prerogatives, and with such duties as may from time to time be prescribed by the Statutes or Regulations of the said Order, and requiring that in performing the said duties the said Professor Mark Raymond Compton shall be obedient unto such commands orders or directions as the Sovereign Head, or we, by Her authority, may from time to time specify, to have hold exercise and enjoy the said Office of Lord Prior of the said Most Venerable Order from the Feast of the Nativity of St John the Baptist on the Twenty-fourth day of June Two Thousand and Nineteen during Our Pleasure and subject thereto until the Feast of the Nativity of St John the Baptist in the year Two Thousand and Twenty-two.

Given at Clerkenwell under our hand and the Seal of The Most Venerable Order of the Hospital of St John of Jerusalem this First day of June Two Thousand and Nineteen and in the Sixty-eighth year of Her Majesty's reign."

My Lord Grand Prior, we present to Your Royal Highness our Confrère, Professor Mark Raymond Compton, a Member of the Order of Australia and a Bailiff Grand Cross of our Most Venerable Order, whom you have selected as the Lieutenant and Deputy of Your Royal Highness in the administration and governance of the Order, to receive the honour of Installation.

His Royal Highness The Grand Prior Confrère, it is with great pleasure that we receive you for installation as Lord Prior of St John.

The Grand Prior then rises and all please stand.

The Chancellor returns to his place. The Grand Prior descends from the Throne, takes the Lord Prior by the left hand and leads him to the empty seat.

His Royal Highness The Grand Prior We now confirm you as our Lieutenant and Deputy in the administration and governance of our Most Venerable Order under our most Gracious Sovereign Lady Queen Elizabeth.

The Lord Prior sits.

The Grand Prior places his right hand on each of the Lord Prior's shoulders, saying:

His Royal Highness We now install you with the style and title of Lord Prior of St John. The Grand Prior

He then takes the Badge from the cushion and places it around the neck of the Lord Prior, steps back and bows to the Lord Prior.

The Lord Prior rises and bows to His Royal Highness The Grand Prior, who acknowledges the salutation.

The Grand Prior then returns to the Throne.

#### THE HOMAGE

The faldstool is placed before the Throne and the Sword Bearer moves to the right of the Grand Prior. His Royal Highness The Grand Prior rises. The Order Director of Ceremonies then conducts the new Lord Prior before the Grand Prior.

The Order Director My Lord Grand Prior, the new Lord Prior of St John will now offer his of Ceremonies homage.

The Lord Prior kneels and places his hand on the Sword of the Order, held by the Sword Bearer.

The Lord Prior I, Mark Raymond Compton, a Member of Order of Australia and a

Bailiff Grand Cross of our Most Venerable Order, do pay homage to you My Lord Grand Prior for this my Lieutenancy and Deputyship for the good governance of our Order which I hold of you, and of Our Sovereign Lady Queen Elizabeth, the Sovereign Head of this Most

Venerable Order of the Hospital of St John of Jerusalem.

His Royal Highness We accept that homage and direct that proclamation be made accordingly.

His Royal Highness The Grand Prior will bow to the newly appointed Lord Prior then resumes the Throne. The Lord Prior rises in his place and bows to His Royal Highness The Grand Prior.

#### THE PROCLAMATION

The Order Director of Ceremonies, taking the Lord Prior's right hand faces the assembly and makes the proclamation.

The Order Director of Ceremonies

Confrères, be it known that His Royal Highness The Grand Prior hath this day inducted and installed as Lord Prior of the Order, our Confrère, Professor Mark Raymond Compton, a Member of Order of Australia and a Bailiff Grand Cross of our Most Venerable Order. Wherefore I call upon you to rise and salute the new Lord Prior of our Most Venerable Order.

The Order Director of Ceremonies will present the Lord Prior to bow to the East, South, West, and North Assembly in turn. All except the Grand Prior return the bow to the Lord Prior.

All Banners are lowered to the 'Present' and returned to 'Order' on completion.

Postulants please rise.

The Lord Prior rises from his place, bows to His Royal Highness The Grand Prior, and says:

The Lord Prior

Confrères, The Grand Prior is about to invest you with the Insignia of your Grade in this Most Venerable Order of the Hospital of St John of Jerusalem. Before he does so, it is incumbent on me to address two questions to you.

First, do you severally promise to pay due obedience to the governing authorities of the Most Venerable Order of the Hospital of St John of Jerusalem as laid down in our Royal Charter, in all things consistent with your duty to our Sovereign Head and your country?

The Postulants

I do.

The Lord Prior

Secondly, will you do all in your power to contribute to the dignity, prosperity and utility of the Order, combating everything that is prejudicial to its well-being and devoting yourselves – so far as you are able – to the objects and purposes of the Order, most especially the Christian care of the sick and injured; and will you conduct yourself as true Dames and Knights, and as people of honour?

The Postulants

I will, God being my helper.

The Lord Prior

My Lord Grand Prior, I present these Postulants for the honour of being invested and received by Your Royal Highness in accordance with the Statutes of our Most Venerable Order.

His Royal Highness The Grand Prior rises from the Throne and moves to the centre facing west, attended by the Lord Prior, the Chancellor, and the Sword Bearer, all standing, while he addresses the Postulants:

His Royal Highness The Grand Prior By virtue of the powers vested in me, I am about to invest and receive you with the Insignia of your Grade, on behalf of Her Majesty our Sovereign Head.

His Royal Highness The Grand Prior Remember that the Cross you will receive is to Christians the sign of Man's Redemption; that its arms symbolise the four cardinal virtues, Prudence, Temperance, Justice, and Fortitude and that its points symbolise the Eight Beatitudes, which spring from the practice of those virtues, namely: Humility; Sorrow for Sin; Meekness; Thirst for Righteousness; Mercy; Purity; Peace; and Suffering under Persecution; while its whiteness may ever remind you of the purity of life required of Christ's soldiers and servants. Remember also that the Mantle with which you are about to be invested is the outward sign of your duty to act in the defence of the Christian Faith, and in the service of the poor, the sick and the suffering.

The Order Director of Ceremonies

The Postulants will please be seated.

#### THE INVESTITURE OF A DAME GRAND CROSS

The Postulant Dame Grand Cross now stands.

The Chancellor My Lord Grand Prior, for investiture as Dame Grand Cross, Mary

Angela Fiona, The Honourable Lady Barttelot, a Member of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, and a Deputy Lieutenant of the

County of West Sussex.

The Postulant is accompanied by two Esquires, one carrying the Insignia which is placed on the cushion held by the Lord Prior, and the other carrying her Banner.

The Postulant Dame Grand Cross curtsies before His Royal Highness The Grand Prior. The Order Director of Ceremonies then removes her Mantle. The Grand Prior invests the Postulant with the Insignia of her Grade. The Order Director of Ceremonies replaces her Mantle. His Royal Highness The Grand Prior formally receives the Postulant by shaking her right hand with the words:

His Royal Highness Sister, I receive you as a Dame Grand Cross of this Most Venerable

The Grand Prior Order.

The Dame Grand Cross stands back and to one side, while the Director of Ceremonies addresses the Grand Prior:

The Order Director My Lord Grand Prior, I present the Banner of the newly invested of Ceremonies Dame Grand Cross, which according to custom, will hereafter be

On completion the Dame Grand Cross curtsies, and her Esquires bow to His Royal Highness, and she and her Esquires move to their appointed places.

#### THE INVESTITURE OF DAMES AND KNIGHTS

The Chancellor will then announce each Postulant Dame by name, who will be escorted by the Order Director of Ceremonies for presentation to His Royal Highness The Grand Prior. The Postulant is accompanied by two Esquires, one carrying the Insignia which is placed on a cushion held by the Lord Prior, and the other carrying a Mantle which is handed to the Order Director of Ceremonies.

Upon arrival before His Royal Highness The Grand Prior they will curtsey. His Royal Highness The Grand Prior will then invest them with their Insignia, and the Order Director of Ceremonies will invest them with their Mantle.

His Royal Highness The Grand Prior receives the newly appointed Dames with a handshake and the words:

His Royal Highness Sister, I receive you as a Dame of this Most Venerable Order. The Grand Prior

The Dame curtsies to His Royal Highness The Grand Prior, turns and leading her two Esquires, returns to their appointed places.

The faldstool is positioned in front of the His Royal Highness The Grand Prior.

The Chancellor announces the name of each Knight who is escorted by the Order Director of Ceremonies for presentation to His Royal Highness The Grand Prior. The Postulant is accompanied by two Esquires, one carrying the Insignia which is placed on the cushion held by the Lord Prior, and the other carrying the Mantle, which is handed to the Order Director of Ceremonies.

The Postulant Knight kneels before His Royal Highness The Grand Prior on the faldstool on his right knee.

When the Postulant is kneeling the Sword Bearer hands the Sword to His Royal Highness The Grand Prior who confers the Accolade of the Order on the left shoulder and returns the Sword to the Sword Bearer.

Receiving the Insignia from the Lord Prior, His Royal Highness The Grand Prior hangs it round each Postulant's neck. The Order Director of Ceremonies then invests the Postulant with his Mantle.

His Royal Highness The Grand Prior then formally receives the kneeling Postulant by taking him by the right hand and raising him with the words:

His Royal Highness Rise, Confrère, I receive you as a Knight of this Most Venerable The Grand Prior Order.

The Knight bows to His Royal Highness The Grand Prior, turns and leading his two Esquires, returns to their appointed places.

Hereafter the procedure is as before until all the Postulants have been invested and they and their Esquires have returned to their appointed places.

#### The Chancellor returns to his place.

#### THE PROCESSIONAL SYMBOLS

The Great Banner of the Order is carried in procession in public, but not inside St John's Gate. It displays the ancient arms of the Order and bears an augmentation of honour, being embellished with a representation of the Royal Crest in the first quarter, an especial mark of Royal favour granted by His Majesty King George V. The new Great Banner used today was dedicated at St Paul's Cathedral on St John's Day, 23 June 1984. The old Great Banner, laid up at the same service, is preserved in St John's Gate.

The Cross of the Order is the symbol of the spiritual jurisdiction of the Prelate and, when he is present, it is carried immediately in front of him in procession. Although the Cross used today is an exact replica, made in 1982, the ancient cross, which may be seen in the Order's Museum in St John's Gate, is a fine example of parcel-gilt repoussé work and was first used by the Order in France in the 16th century. It came to the Most Venerable Order in 1904 through the bequest of Lady Lechmere.

The Sword of the Order, which was made by Wilkinson in 1944, is the emblem of the temporal jurisdiction of Her Majesty The Queen, The Sovereign Head. In Her Majesty's absence, it is borne immediately in front of His Royal Highness The Grand Prior or his representative. It is also used when conferring the Accolade of the Order at Receptions and Investitures of Knights, and on such occasions is borne unsheathed. On Royal occasions, and for the Annual Service of Commemoration and Re-dedication in St Paul's Cathedral on St John's Day, the Sword is sheathed in the Royal or State scabbard, first used by Her Majesty in 1971; for other events the black duty scabbard is used.

#### THE PRIORY CHURCH OF ST JOHN

The Church in which today's service has taken place stands on the site of the original round church built by the Knights of St John and consecrated in 1185. Only the Crypt of this church survives, however the line of the old circular nave can be seen in the pavement outside.

Rebuilt several times, the Church fell into disuse following the Dissolution of the Monasteries by Henry VIII in 1540. The Church was then used as a private chapel and later as a parish church until 1931 when the Church of England transferred ownership back to the Order of St John. The building was repaired again following bomb damage caused during the Second World War.

The Church stood at the centre of the Order's Priory in Clerkenwell, of which only the Church and the South Gate, now called St John's Gate, remain.

Today, the Priory Church is used for the services and investitures of the Most Venerable Order of the Hospital of St John of Jerusalem. On the walls hang the banners of The Sovereign Head, The Grand Prior, the Priories and Commanderies, and the Bailiffs and Dames Grand Cross.



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
